MN Tests of Academic Skills (MTAS)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Alternate standard-based accountability assessment, designed for, and limited to, students with the most significant cognitive disabilities</li> <li>• Designed to measure student progress toward Minnesota's academic standards and meet the requirements of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA)</li> <li>• <b><i>Time: Untimed (typical range for reading: 45 min. – 90 min.; math &amp; science: 30 min. – 60 min)</i></b></li> </ul>	<a href="#">Minn. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Assess progress towards meeting the WIDA English Language Development Standards</li> <li>• Used to determine academic needs and track progress of English Language Learners (ELL) in core areas</li> <li>• <b>Time: 60 – 90 minutes depending on subject</b></li> </ul>		Reading, Speaking, Listening, and Writing: K-12 <sup>th</sup>
Alternate ACCESS for ELL	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• An individually administered English language proficiency accountability assessment developed specifically for English learners who have significant cognitive disabilities</li> <li>• Used to determine academic needs and track progress of cognitively impaired English Language Learners (ELL)</li> <li>• <b>Time: Untimed</b></li> </ul>	<a href="#">ESEA</a>	Reading, Speaking, Listening, and Writing: K-12 <sup>th</sup>
FAST Bridge Assessments	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Measure individual student progress in reading fluency, mathematics, and compare to national norms</li> <li>• Test results are used for individual student programming</li> <li>• Summary of results are used to guide curriculum and instruction decisions and to improve reading and math programming</li> <li>• <b>Time: Untimed; administered individually; about 5 minutes for general and 20 minutes for aRead/aMath Fall, Winter and Spring administration</b></li> </ul>		PreK – 8 <sup>th</sup>
Armed Service Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A multiple-aptitude battery that measures developed abilities and helps predict future academic and occupational success in the military.</li> </ul>		11 <sup>th</sup>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Helps determine student aptitudes and interests</li> <li>• Assists with career and post-high school planning</li> <li>• <b>Time: 2hr 53 min. time limit for online assessment and 2hr 29 min. time limit for paper &amp; pencil assessment</b></li> </ul>		
ACT	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Standardized test used for college admission</li> <li>• Provides students with information related to college and career readiness</li> <li>• The ACT test covers four academic skill areas: English, mathematics, reading, and scientific reasoning. It also offers an optional direct writing test.</li> <li>• The school district offers the ACT to juniors every spring at no cost. PSAT	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Measures readiness for college</li> <li>• Provides access to scholarships</li> <li>• Practice for SAT</li> <li>• Student responsible for cost</li> </ul>		10 <sup>th</sup> & 11 <sup>th</sup> (targeted at 11 <sup>th</sup> grade students)
MN Citizenship Test	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• MN law requires all high school students to pass a Civics Test (50 of the 100 questions from the United States Customs and Immigration Services (USCIS) civics test.)</li> <li>• Students must correctly answer at least 30 of the 50 questions</li> <li>• Student may be given the questions as many times as necessary to pass</li> <li>• <b><i>Time: Untimed</i></b></li> </ul>	<a href="#">Minn. Stat. 120B.02</a>	9 <sup>th</sup> – 12 <sup>th</sup> (given during the year a student is enrolled in Civics)
